VERBAL ANALOGY

Verbal analogy is a reasoning skill that establishes a relationship between two pairs of words. The goal is to identify the relationship between the first pair and find a second pair of words that share the same relationship. Verbal analogies test your vocabulary, logical reasoning, and understanding of relationships.

Structure of Verbal Analogies

The format is typically: **A** : **B** :: **C** : **D** This is read as: "A is to B as C is to D." You need to determine the relationship between **A** and **B** to find the correct match for **C** and **D**.

Types of Relationships in Verbal Analogies

- 1. **Synonyms (Similar Meaning):** Example: Happy : Joyful :: Sad : Miserable (*Both pairs have similar meanings.*)
- 2. Antonyms (Opposite Meaning): Example: Hot : Cold :: Light : Dark (Both pairs are opposites.)
- 3. **Part to Whole:** Example: Petal : Flower :: Finger : Hand (*A part makes up the whole.*)
- 4. **Cause and Effect:** Example: Rain : Flood :: Heat : Drought (*One leads to the other*.)
- 5. **Function/Use:** Example: Pen : Write :: Knife : Cut (*Each word indicates the primary function of the other.*)
- 6. **Degree/Intensity:** Example: Warm : Hot :: Cool : Cold (*The second word is a more intense version of the first.*)
- 7. **Category/Type:** Example: Rose : Flower :: Oak : Tree (*Each word belongs to a specific category.*)
- 8. Sequence or Order: Example: Day : Night :: Morning : Evening (A sequence of events or time.)

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How to Solve Verbal Analogies?

- Understand the Relationship: Analyze the relationship between the first pair of words.
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- 2. Identify the Type of Relationship: Is it synonymy, antonymy, cause-effect, part-whole, etc.?
- 3. **Apply the Same Relationship to the Second Pair:** Use the same logic to complete the second pair.
- 4. Eliminate Wrong Options: If multiple choices are provided, rule out irrelevant or mismatched ones.

Example Question:

Question: Pen : Write :: Scissors : ?
Options:
a) Cut
b) Paper
c) Sharp
d) Tool

Answer: a) Cut Explanation: The pen is used to write, just as scissors are used to cut. This is a "Function/Use" analogy.

Verbal analogies are common in competitive exams and tests, helping assess critical thinking and logical reasoning.

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
