> REPORTING SPEECH

- Anu said to me, "I want your pen". (past tense)

 Questions might be
- Anu says to me, "I want your pen". (present tense)

Present tense, Future, - Tense alone will not change. Past tense- Four changes happens.





Examples

1. Ram said to me, "I want your pen today".

Ram told me that he wanted my pen that day.

2. Anu says to me, "I want your book today".

Anu says to me that he wants my pen that day.

Direct speech	Indirect speech
Present tense – (am/ is are) (Sing, eat, go)	Past tense (was/were) (sang, ate, went)
Present continuous- (is singing, I am singing)	Past continuous- (was singing, were singing)
Present perfect- Has/ Have Has sung, have sung	Past perfect- had sung
Past tense – sang was/were	Past perfect- had been
Past continuous was/were- singing	Past perfect continuous had been singing
will, shall, can, may	Would, should, could, might.

Past tense

Ashok said, "I drive car very well".

Indirect speech

Ashok told that he drove car very well.



Past continuous



Direct speech

Shaju said, "I am driving car very well".

Indirect speech

Shaju told that he was driving car very well.



PRESENT PERFECT



Direct speech

Shaju said, "I have driven a car".

Indirect speech
Shaju told that he had driven a car.



Past tense ———— Past perfect



Direct speech

Shaju said, "I drove a car yesterday".

Indirect speech

Shaju told that he had driven a car the previous day.

Direct speech

Ashok said, "I was driving a car".

Indirect speech

Ashok told that he had been driving a car.



Past perfect ——won't change
